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
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INTRODUCTION

This addendum is intended to be used in conjunction with the Post-Pandemic Business Playbook to support the selection and implementation of controls to reduce the risk of COVID-19 exposure in the workplace. The information in this addendum, although a great starting point for employers, may not be adequate for all workplaces. A detailed review of site specific risk factors will support a safer workplace.

Each workplace is unique and therefore should implement controls based on the level of risk in their workplace. This begins with conducting a risk assessment and using the hierarchy of controls to help reduce the risk of COVID-19 exposure. The risk can be further mitigated by implementing a combination of controls.





Some controls may be more difficult to implement than others (e.g. engineering controls versus administrative controls). The examples provided herein are based on best practices and the most current information available on COVID-19 transmission from the Public Health Ontario (PHO) and the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC). It is important that workplaces are aware of the most current government direction and implement controls as appropriate. Where available, employers are encouraged to review supporting documentation and seek further guidance from their local public health units.

When elimination, engineering and administrative controls are not adequate in reducing the risk to an acceptable level, protective equipment can be considered. The employer is responsible for ensuring adequate supplies of protective equipment are available at the workplace, as required by the company's hazards risk assessment. A FOCUSED LOOK AT RISK FACTORS AND CONTROLS IN THE AGRICULTURE SECTOR

Wherever workers may have contact with co-workers and/or various surfaces there is the potential for the spread of COVID-19. It is important that employers review how they can minimize these risks within their facilities.

Employers should use the hierarchy of controls to anticipate and recognize the hazards and use appropriate controls. When implementing new controls, it is important that they do not affect other safety controls (i.e. emergency stops, emergency egress, etc.) already implemented in the workplace. The following table provides a variety of controls that may assist the agriculture sector by providing considerations for various risk factors, however it does not provide an inclusive list of options available.

The controls listed in the table below are made in addition to the following controls:

- Health screening (onsite and self-screen)
- Physical distancing (2 metres or 6 feet), where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure
- Personal hygiene (including access to handwashing/hand sanitizers, cough and sneeze etiquette)
- Increased cleaning and sanitation

POTENTIAL RISK & EXAMPLES

Close Work Activity in Outdoors

- Planting & harvesting
- Animal handling

SAMPLE CONTROLS

- Section or expand work areas where possible
- Access to hand washing stations, hand sanitizer, and, defined handwashing schedule
- Stagger shift and break times
- Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure
- Refer to government guidelines regarding face coverings where recommended and/or where other controls may not be possible

Close Work Activity Indoors

- Greenhouse planting & harvesting
- Packing lines and materials
- Animal handling
- Milk parlour
- Hayloft
- Mushroom farming

- Stagger shift and break times
- Defined handwashing schedule
- Physical barriers between work areas
- Implement staggered workstations, expanded work surfaces
- Stagger shift and break times
- Create work groups, maintain group composition to reduce cross exposure if possible
- Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure
- Refer to government guidelines regarding face coverings where recommended and/or where other controls may not be possible



POTENTIAL RISK & EXAMPLES

SAMPLE CONTROLS

Common Spaces

- Production packing lines
- Barn
- Office
- Garage or shop
- Meeting space for safety talks
- Growing rooms

- Create physical distancing in standing space, seats and table placement
- Establish suitable area for meetings, limit number of workers in a room or space
- Eliminate shared containers for refreshments
- Stagger shift and break times
- Install signage to remind of safe work protocols
- Encourage workers to change prior to leaving work
- Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure

Shared Living Quarters

 Bunkhouse; inclusive of kitchens, bathrooms, laundry room, bedrooms

- Prepare for new worker quarantine process as directed by Health Canada
- Limit number of people in or expand living quarters where possible
- Translate common work teams into accommodation team
- Establish a schedule with assignment for cleaning, laundry and cooking
- Ensure living space is well ventilated
- Physical barriers (where applicable or possible)
- Create physical distancing in standing space, seats and table placement
- Eliminate shared containers and items
- Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure

Transportation

- Bus
- Tractor (cab)
- Van
- Wagon

- Limit the number of passengers per single trip
- Increase number of trips
- Staggered shifts to accommodate difference in transportation requirement
- Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure
- Refer to government guidelines regarding face coverings where recommended and/or where other controls may not be possible

Shared Use of Equipment and Tools

- Vehicles
- Hand tools
- Wash sinks
- Milking equipment
- Office equipment

- Defined hand washing schedule
- Create and maintain a cleaning and sanitization schedule of all surfaces, equipment and tools
- Create a policy and procedure for cleaning and disinfection of equipment

External VisitorsInspectors and other authoritiesVisiting drivers	 Screening protocol for visitors Visitor to follow host instructions communicated in advance and onsite Driver to remain in vehicle when trailer is being loaded Where distancing cannot be established, communicate specific work procedures to minimize exposure Any additional industry specific guidance as required
MeetingsSafety talksOperational meetingsSafety meetings	 Establish suitable area for meetings, limit number of participants in a room or space Ensure room is well ventilated where possible Ensure workers are 2 meters apart in standing space, or when using seats and table placement
